Dr. Jain has extensive clinical and research experience and has published many peer-reviewed articles. Prior to his retirement few years ago as Assistant Deputy Undersecretary for Health, he was involved in the development of many innovative clinical programs and patient safety improvements in the Veterans Health Administration over a period of 37 years.

Dr. Jain received his Doctor of Medicine degree from Saurashtra University in India, in 1972. He is certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine and Subspecialty Boards of Hematology and Oncology. Potential pathways for this therapy to work may include, modulation of dopamine and serotonin in Central nervous System and its impact on the endocrine systems.
